Hebrews on Easter: "The Founder of Their Salvation" by Pastor Sutton

THE writer of Hebrews (the epistle we continue to study in Adult Bible Class on Sunday mornings) tells his listeners concerning Jesus Christ:

It has been testified somewhere [quoting Psalm 8.4-6], "What is man, that you are mindful of him, or the son of man, that you care for him? You made him for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned him with glory and honor, putting everything in subjection under his feet."

Now in putting everything in subjection to him, he left nothing outside his control. At present, we do not yet see everything in subjection to him. But we see him who for a little while was made lower than the angels, namely Jesus, crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone. For it was fitting that he, for whom and by whom all things exist, in bringing many sons to glory, should make the founder of their salvation perfect through suffering (Hebrews 2.6-10).

Here the teacher of Hebrews takes Psalm 8 as a prophecy of the contrast between:

- the temporary humiliation of Jesus-what we call His "State of Humiliation" (from His conception in the Virgin Mary by the power of the Holy Spirit to His suffering, death, and burial); and
- His coronation as the King of all with God's own glory and status: "everything in subjection under His feet." This is Jesus' ongoing "State of Exaltation" (from the descent into hell and His resurrection on Easter Day onward into all eternity, for the age to come).

This is the mystery of Christ's death that we observe yet again at the end of this year's pilgrimage through Lent - that through Jesus' death, He is glorified and honored. Jesus is brought so low that He suffers death as a man, and yet is crowned with glory and honor through His death. Furthermore, by His exaltation, all who believe in Him are also glorified and honored with Him. He tasted death for everyone, and has brought "many sons to glory" - all sons of the Father who are Jesus' brothers, who believe and are baptized into His death and resurrection.

This exaltation of Christ and His brothers is founded on the "grace of God" seen in His vicarious death on behalf of every person on earth. Purely out of His great love for us, the Father brought the Son of Man so low in order Continued on page 3

continued from page 1 to raise man so high together with Him. He who was by right God's Son suffered death on behalf of everyone, so that by God's grace the undeserving sinful sons of the first Adam could become once again sons of the Heavenly Father, which is something that by right does not belong to them.

So Christians, see by faith a vision of the humiliation of Jesus, and you see in His death your death with Him. See also by faith the vision of His exaltation, and by God's grace you also see that you are destined to share in His glory and honor as God's royal sons, heirs with Him in the world to come. Though you are to die to this life, you share in the glory of God's Son who tasted death on your behalf so that you might taste life fully with Him in the new age to come.

This is Hebrew's take on Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection. The Son did not just assume human flesh and blood and then suffer and die as a neat historical trick to form some sort of unique world religion. No. It was fitting for God and His Son to accomplish salvation this way—it is the goal of God that His Son takes you, His human brothers, bodily into the

glory of heaven with Him. This is the "fitting" purpose of His suffering, death, and resurrection.

This makes Jesus, we note, not the "founder of Christianity" but the "founder [or pioneer] of their salvation" - the sons of God by faith who will share in Jesus' glory. The Greek word for "founder" in Hebrews 2.10 here is archegos, which combines the word for "beginning" or "foundation" with the verb for "to lead on a journey" ("ago" in English letters, but you see our word "go" there, right?). A pioneer. A leader. Jesus is the Good Shepherd pioneering the way through the valley of the shadow of death. He bids us go with Him to that wonderful place, to "dwell in the house of the Lord forever" as Psalm 23 preaches. And we do not go where He has not first pioneered the way. Through death. Into life.

God grant to you and your family a blessed and joyful Eastertide, celebrating the exaltation of our Lord Jesus Christ, the pioneering founder of our salvation, who leads us through death to this life into the eternal home He has for all who believe! **

Faithlessness/Faithfulness

"AND going a little farther He fell on His face and prayed, saying, 'My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will'" (St. Matthew 26.39).

Times of testing often show whether

someone is faithful or faithless. The Israelites, when tested in the wilderness, failed time and again and so proved themselves faithless. As a result, they were not allowed to enter the Promised Land

and were eventually cast into exile. These do not stand as mere historical facts, but also as warnings, so that we might not be faithless as they were.

We see in the Garden of Gethsemane a reversal of mankind's constant inclination to faithlessness... faithlessness, which got man cast out of the Garden. Adam was tested and was faithless. However, in this Garden, Jesus, in the place of all humanity and despite His innocence, submits to His Father's will. In Jesus' time of testing, He remained faithful. In His very body and blood, you receive not only His faithfulness, but also strength to endure whatever trials or temptations beset you. So receive Him. Often. And keep your eyes fixed firmly on Him.

Then for all that wrought my pardon,
For Thy sorrows deep and sore,
For Thine anguish in the Garden,
I will thank Thee evermore,
Thank Thee for Thy groaning, sighing,
For Thy bleeding and Thy dying,
For that last triumphant cry,
And shall praise Thee, Lord, on high.

(LSB 420:7)

O God, You justify the ungodly and desire not the death of the sinner. Graciously assist us by Your heavenly aid and evermore shield us with Your protection, that no temptation may separate us from Your love in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Amen **

The Tre Ore

ONE ancient Christian custom of meditation on Our Lord's Passion and death is the Tre Ore ("three hours") on Good Friday. The Tre Ore is celebrated from Noon-3pm because those are the hours Christ hung on the cross.

The Tre Ore has three segments: Noon Prayer; the Solemn Liturgy (Divine Service) at 12:30; and Afternoon Prayer at 2:30.

At Noon Prayer, the familiar prophesy concerning Christ from Isaiah 53 is read, including:

He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he has borne our

griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned – every one – to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he opened not his mouth.

At Divine Service, the Passion according to St. John is the Gospel lesson for the day. Each section of the Gospel is followed with singing a stanza of "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" (450), Paul Gerhardt's version of a longer work by Bernard of Clairvaux.

The Bidding Prayer is prayed, including petitions for the Church, clergy, catechumens, those in authority, those outside the church, for peace, our enemies, and for the fruits of the earth, knowing that in Christ's sacrifice to Our Father, we have access to approach Him for all needs of the church and the world.



The Good Friday Reproaches are sung alternating with Nicolaus Decius' hymn "Lamb of God, Pure and Holy" (434). The reproaches are passages from Micah 6.3-4; Jeremiah 2.6-7; and Isaiah 5.2-4.

Among the Passiontide hymns sung throughout the Tre Ore includes the ancient hymn of Venantius Fortunatus: "Sing, My Tongue, the Glorious Battle."

This hymn ties various aspects of Christ's life and work to His Passion and death for our salvation.

Following the distribution of Holy Communion, Afternoon Prayer concludes with the Litany of Repentance, the Litany of the Passion and readings from Lamentations 3.

The Tre Ore is a beautiful and meaningful Christian custom as the chief service of Good Friday.

Plan to make the Tre Ore on Friday, April 19, a part of your Holy Week meditation this year. If you are unable to stay for the entire Tre Ore, there are brief pauses at 12:30 and 2:30 to enter or depart. ❖

The Bach Cello Suites Depict the Life of Christ by Rigo Barrozo

JOHANN Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) wrote six pieces for solo cello (*BWV* 1007-1012) that are widely considered foundational in cello repertoire. These pieces represent the best of cello composition in the Baroque era. Bach, a devout Lutheran, described all his music written to the "glory of God." These pieces are no exception. Though they were not written for church use, they nevertheless mimic key moments in Bach's sacred music.

World-renowned cellist Steven Isserlis believes the six pieces represent the life of Christ. The first suite represents the Annunciation; the second, His temptation in the desert and agony in the garden; the third, the Holy Spirit descending on Him; the fourth, His Presentation in the Temple; the fifth, the Crucifixion; and the sixth, the Resurrection.

How fitting, therefore, would it be to hear the second suite depicting our Lord's temptation and suffering through the six weeks of Lent! It perfectly works out that the suites are divided into six movements. So, during distribution, you will hear one movement each Sunday up to Palm Sunday. The last movement is a lively gigue: fitting for our Lord's triumphant entry! On Good Friday, a movement from the fifth suite representing the crucifixion will be played, as well as a movement from the sixth on Easter Sunday! **

Council of Deacons Report by Richard Monday

THE March 2 meeting opened with meditation on the Scriptures, in which Pastor led a prayer for the parish, followed by the study of the Lutheran Confessions, the Formula of Concord, Solid Declaration, Article VII on the Lord's Supper.

Pastor Sutton reported on membership changes since the last meeting, two deaths in the parish. Pastor shared the appraisal done by the art expert from Indianapolis on the reredos painting, as requested by our insurance company. The insurance agent indicated that the company is satisfied with our level of coverage, including the value of the painting and the wooden reredos.

Vicar Cornwell highlighted the District Men's Retreat in early April at Camp Lakeview near Seymour.

In ongoing business, Kris Wineinger presented possible plans for new front landscaping. Kris Bilyeu reported on the progress of the new church library and conference room. John Schulz

reported that Kristin Schulz is in the process of cataloging our current library books and materials.

Board Reports:

Finance: February 2019 offerings were lower due to inclement weather. Reported on the status of the Edward Jones investment account, which holds a donated gift of stock.

Outreach: No report.

Property and Grounds: Rich Bucy distributed an estimate with materials breakdown from EAS Technology Consultants for the proposed new security system. Rich recommended and the consensus of the Deacons was that the work should be done. No timetable was set. The shelter-house project is slated for June.

Education: The board met in February and set Vacation Bible School for the week of June 17-21. **Worship Support:** All usher spots are filled.

The next regular meeting of the Council of Deacons is Saturday, April 6 at 7am in the Parish Center. Other communicant members who wish to meet with the Council of Deacons to discuss special concerns, needs, or requests should make arrangements with the Chairman of the Council of Deacons prior to a scheduled meeting. ❖
