#### Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word

Looking at Lutheran Service Book 655, authored by Dr. Martin Luther (1483-1546)

If you watch *Fox News Channel*, or listen daily to talk radio hosts, or read our newspaper in town, or have your ear to social media outlets, you might easily become depressed at the current state of affairs in this country and in the world.

Liberal-socialist activists in our legislatures and judiciary do all they can to denigrate traditional, Biblical morality, and especially they attack traditional marriage and family, pushing the homosexual and "transgendered" deviant agenda in our schools and across the popular media. The abortion rights agenda is pushed at the expense of the lives of many children. The recent grisly discovery of over two thousand preserved aborted children in the home of a deceased abortion doctor shines the light on the wicked truth behind those antiseptic words, "pro-choice." Christians are treated as if they are the evil for calling wickedness what it is. Not to mention, false teaching of the Scriptures is pervasive through today's Christianity.

It seems the world is falling apart. Yet, nothing is new. Consider this situation from the time of the Reformation: The King of Spain suffers a severe defeat to the Moslem Turks at Budapest in August 1541, and the Turks are threatening Vienna and then Germany itself. Two months later, a hurricane near Algiers destroys the fleet of Holy Roman Emperor Charles V. In July 1542, the French King makes an alliance with the Turkish Sultan, and it was reported that the Pope favored this new alliance with the Moslems! Imagine wondering if the Pope and the Turk are in alliance against the rest of Christendom!

Sometime in late 1541, the Wittenberg Lutherans held a special prayer service to pray for God's intervention against the Turkish threat. It seems Luther penned this well known hymn for this service. Our English translation is now "politically correct" – here is a translation of the original first stanza:

Lord, keep us in Thy Word and work, Restrain the murderous Pope and Turk Who fain would tear from off Thy throne Christ Jesus, Thy beloved Son.

When our lives are not subject to God's Word, when we are

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not steadfast in the Word, when we try to exalt ourselves above Christ and His Word, we become "murderous" instruments of Satan, used to bring to naught the work of Christ, tempting others to put their faith in idols.

But when Christians are in the heat of trial, which is every day we are alive in this temporal strife, they must return in faith to the Divine Service and receive the living Word of Christ in their ears and mouths. His means of grace alone defend His bride the Church.

Lord Jesus Christ, Your pow'r make known, For You are Lord of lords alone; Defend Your holy Church that we May sing Your praise eternally.

Our prayer is that we remain steadfast in the Word, despite the fiery trials. In Baptism, we have died to this life, which means we have died with Christ. Now we pray that Christ makes His power known in our life, that Christ takes His rightful place in our life and increases His Kingdom as only He can, through giving us the forgiveness He won for us in His suffering and death. This is the Lord of lords defending His Church, you.

O Comforter of priceless worth, Send peace and unity on earth, Support us in our final strife And lead us out of death to life.

Through the Word of the Gospel, the Holy Spirit brings not just any peace and unity, but that which has been bought and paid for by the blood of Jesus, the forgiveness of sins. The Spirit brings us the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting – the hope of the world to come.

"Do not be surprised at the fiery trial," St. Peter says. "But rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when His glory is revealed. If you are insulted for the name of Christ, you are blessed, because the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you... Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time He may exalt you, casting all your anxieties on Him, because He cares for you." (1 Peter 4.12-14, 5.6-7) \textsquare

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# From Rebellion to Inheritance by Vicar Keller

MAGGIE and I recently found out that our baby is a boy. We rejoice that God has given us the gift of a child. Children are, without a doubt, a blessing from God. He created woman out of man, seeing that it was not good for man to be alone. She was bone of his bone and flesh of his flesh. Luther used to call his wife Katie 'my rib.' God blessed Adam and Eve when He said, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth." Indeed, this is one of the joys of marriage.

Yet sometimes, children do not act as they are commanded in the Fourth Commandment: Honor your father and your mother. We do not need to go out of Genesis to see children commit acts of sin. Adam's own son, Cain, killed his brother. Jacob deceived his father to receive the blessing appointed for Esau. Joseph's brothers sold him into slavery and lied about his death to their father. In sin, children rebel against their vocations, and fracture the family. Sons were to inherit from their father, with the eldest receiving a double portion. When a son rebelled against their father, the continuation of the line was in jeopardy. Deuteronomy 22 says this about rebellious sons: "Then all the men of the city shall stone him to death with stones. So you shall purge the evil from your midst, and all Israel shall hear, and fear."

This is exactly what God did to the rebellious sons that were the children of Israel. Isaiah 1.2-3 says, "Children have I reared and brought up, but they have rebelled against me. The ox knows its owner, and the donkey its master's crib, but Israel does not know, my people do not understand." The children of Israel, the line through which God promised a Messiah, did not follow God's laws, statutes and commands. They lusted after foreign gods and committed atrocities against the Lord. They were indeed rebellious sons, and as such, God turned them

over to their desires, and used invading nations to execute His judgment on them.

We too have rebelled against God in thought, word, and deed. We have not loved Him with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbor as ourselves. We deserve to be cast off as the Israelites were. However, the promise to Adam (Genesis 3.15) and to Abraham (Genesis 12.1; 15.5) remained for His people. God preserved the faithful remnant, through which His son would be born. Jesus came and died for the rebellious sons. He died for you and me. Through His death and resurrection, we are once again His people (1 Peter 2.10). He redeemed those who were under the law that we might receive adoption as sons, meaning that we are heirs to eternal life (Romans 8.15; Galatians 4.4-6).

What inheritance do we receive? Paul writes in Romans 6.4-5, "We were buried therefore with Him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in the newness of life. For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall certainly be united with Him in a resurrection like His." We receive this inheritance, not because of anything we have done, but through our baptism (Titus 3.4-7). The Old Adam, the rebellious son, is daily drowned and dies, and a new man, in Christ, stands justified before God.

We want our children to have better lives than we have had. We want them to know no suffering and evil. But they will fail just as we have. Praise be to God they do not stand on their own merits. In Jesus, they are no longer rebellious sons but they are His people. They are washed clean in the blood of Christ. Therefore, we, as parents are to bring up our children to fear, love and trust in God above all things. In God, they receive all good things. In Him, they receive forgiveness of sins, life and salvation. In Him, they have eternal life as their inheritance. ♥

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#### Singing of Absolution by Kantor Schultz

T is not enough to *think* about forgiveness, or just know that it exists. It must be *given* and *distributed*. Christ gives this gift to His Church in Holy Absolution.

We sing of this in the hymn "'As Surely As I Live,' God Said" (614):

The words which absolution give Are His ho died that we might live, The minister whom Christ has sent Is but His humble instrument.

When ministers lay on their hands, Absolved by Christ the sinner stands, He who by grace the Word believes The purchase of His blood receives.


Author Nikolaus Herman (1480-1561) wrote this hymn around 1560 with the description "A hymn on the power of the keys and the virtue of holy absolution; for the children of Joachimsthal." It is based on St. John 20, the institution of the Office of the Keys and Jesus' appearance to Thomas. It is sung on the Second Sunday of Easter, when we hear this Gospel account proclaimed, and we sing it at other times throughout the year. It would also

be a fitting meditation before or after attending Private Confession and Absolution.

Originally written with eleven stanzas, the omitted stanzas include:

They who believe when ye proclaim
The joyful tidings in My name
That I for them My blood have shed,
Are free from guilt and Judgment dread.

However great our sin may be, The absolution sets us free, Appointed by God's own dear Son To bring the pardon He has won.



# New Wednesday Night Class Offered: "United in Christ"

Hebrews compares and contrasts the present theophany of God through Jesus and His blood in the Divine Service, anticipating its full manifestation at His second coming, with the historical theophany to Israel at Mount Sinai. God now speaks His better Word of grace and pardon, through the voice of Jesus and His speaking blood.

**E**ACH Wednesday, we pray Matins in the church at 8:30am, followed by Bible study in the Parish Center.

October 2 and 9 1 Samuel 2.1-11 "Hannah's Prayer"

The first of four major poems in 1 Samuel, all of which are united by one theme, the anointing of kings, pointing to the future Messiah, or "Christ" (anointed one). This hymn is strikingly similar to St. Mary's Magnificat at the Annunciation of Our Lord.

October 16 1 Samuel 2.12-17 "Eli's Sons and Their Sins"

In contrast to Samuel, the "good-for-nothing" sons of the High Priest Eli sin against God and the Law of Moses.

October 23 1 Samuel 2.18-21 "Samuel Ministers before Yahweh"

Samuel serves before Yahweh as a young Levite at an unusually early age.

October 30 1 Samuel 2.22-26 "Eli Rebukes His Sons"

In contrast to the bad report about Eli's sons, Eli's weak rebuke of their sins, and the hard hearts of the two sons, Samuel continues to grow into manhood and by grace.
