Cheerful Givers

ST. Paul wrote to the Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9.7). *God loves a cheerful giver*. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, Abel gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. (Genesis 4) Abraham was. By faith, Abraham prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. (Genesis 18) So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due for his threshing floor and oxen. (2 Samuel 24) By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where His name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people. (1 Kings 5-6)

"What more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of..." (Hebrews 11.32) all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave. We can all think of faithful Christians in our lives who have known and been examples of this joy.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything, yes, even His life, enduring the cross and scorning its shame. (Hebrews 12.2) He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty we might be rich beyond measure. (2 Corinthians 8.9)

So then, let us – like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and made perfect by our Lord Jesus Christ – give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart – for the joy set before us – the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

I share with you as Thanksgiving approaches this reflection on being a cheerful giver because you have been cheerful givers, brothers and sisters in Christ! You reflect the Savior who has given His all for you. I thank God

But, that increased cost of "doing business" – providing the Ministry of the Gospel – has outpaced our generous giving to our general fund over the last few years. We have had to dip into our reserves. Further, to participate in the vicarage program, one of the main priorities of the ministry plan of this congregation for now over thirty years, the LCMS leadership has put in place higher salary and benefit guidelines which we must meet to participate as a vicarage congregation. So, that cost is increasing.

As we reflect on all the saints who have gone on before us to the joys of heaven, and as we celebrate later in the month the day of national thanksgiving, God grant that our cheerful giving would be used by Him to continue the Ministry of the Gospel here, and at the same time to continue in the Vicarage program, and to continue to be a blessing to our community. Prayerfully consider joining together to change trends for the better starting now and for the years to come. The deacons' letter will share concrete data and information, and ideas for you and your family to consider for pulling together to generously and cheerfully support the work of the Lord here at Immanuel. **

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What's in a Name?

N the Keller household, we have been thinking about names for quite some time. Now that we know our baby is a boy, we can focus in on a few we like. The problem: Which one do we like the best? We hear all kinds of contenders from our families and friends: David, Jacob, Robert, Andrew, Martin, Isaac, Philip, and so on. It is a big decision naming another human.

God created man and named him Adam, which means dirt or earth. This is fitting, for, after the Fall of man, Adam would die and return to dust. Adam named his wife *Hava*-which means life in Hebrew, for she would be the mother of all living. You start to see a pattern here. When the ancients named something, the name held the ambitions of the father. For example, when Eve named her son Cain, which means 'I have acquired,' she thought she had given birth to the Lord. In this instance, however, Cain did not live up to his name, and murdered his brother.

Calling someone by his or her name brings about a personal relationship. When Moses, whose name means 'drawn out,' approached the burning bush, God revealed to him His name, יהוה, Yahweh, which means 'I am who I am.' Most ancient religions featured gods and goddesses, who were vindictive, promiscuous, mischievous, or apathetic toward humanity. Not only is our God none of those, but He wants to have a relationship with His people. By giving His name, He invites us to come to Him. We were baptized into the threefold Name-Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In the Lord's Prayer, we are taught to pray 'Our Father.' This relationship is possible through our Lord, Jesus.

Unlike Cain and many others, Jesus lives up to His name, which means 'ההה'saves.' God Himself was incarnate to accomplish what humanity could not. St. Paul, in Philippians 2.5-11, sums up the work of Christ perfectly. Jesus, though He was in the form of God, took on the form of a servant, the likeness of man. He was obedient to the point of death, even death on the cross. "Therefore God has highly exalted Him and bestowed on Him the Name that is above every name, so that at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2.9-11).

We give thanks to God that even in our sinful state, He desires to have a relationship with His people. He gave His only begotten Son to die for sinners, that whoever believes in Him shall have eternal life. Through baptism, we are reminded what the prophet Isaiah wrote, "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine" (Isaiah 43.1b). The Lord reminds His people that He has not forgotten His covenant promises to them. Therefore, when we think of the name Jesus, we can remember, 'הוה' saves.' \subsetem \textsquare.

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Council of Deacons Report

THE October 5 meeting opened with meditation on the Word of God, in which Pastor led a prayer for the congregation, followed by the study of the Lutheran Confessions, the Formula of Concord, Solid Declaration, Article VII on the Lord's Supper.

Pastor Sutton reported membership changes since the last meeting: Reagan Kyle Elaine Gibbens, daughter of Jared and Heather Gibbens, was baptized. Jim and Linda Haas, Marshall Rector, and Mark and Lisa Gilbert have all been received by profession of faith or transfer. Pastor also updated the board on other potential new members as well as the ongoing adult catechesis. Funeral and burial were conducted for Robert Kelm.

Pastor reported that the LCMS has mandated additional salary and insurance costs for 2020 to participate in the vicarage program. Pastor and deacons discussed our future participation in the program. Without increased ongoing giving from the congregation, Immanuel will not be able to participate.

Board Reports:

• **Finance**: Currently setting up Vanco "Give Plus" app and account for flexible giving to the

congregation electronically. Will be announced at congregational meeting. Giving from the congregation continues to lag behind expenses. 2020 budget will have to be cut if giving is not increased, including possibly our participation in the vicarage program.

- Property and Grounds: Finishing touches on the new shelter will be completed by Daryl Harris and Randy Durlinger as time permits. Kris Bilyeu reported that sample chairs for the new library table are on the way. Daryl Harris will be working on cabinetry and shelves this winter. HVAC quotes for the vicarage house were discussed.
- Outreach/Fellowship: Brad Cress reported on the upcoming Brat Trot.
